Biography:

Filmer is a currently working as a senior data scientist in a national business intelligence directorate with a mandate for creating decision-making tools for all levels of government at both the regional and national level. He has already witnessed, in his relatively short time in the Federal government, the gross mismanagement of public funds to keep phoenix afloat, along with the decreases in technological infrastructure availability and service response since the introduction of Shared Services.
